The Global Education Committee is designed to improve and pursue ministerial excellence globally.

This committee is made up of the Director of Education/AIM as the Chairman; the Coordinator of GATS as the Vice-Chairman; one GATS regional representative from each of the six regions; Regional Directors; and two consultants from the Global Training Institute (GTI). Of course our visionary General Director is an ex-officio member of the GEC.

GATS curriculum is based upon classroom hours rather than credit hours. This allows for all schools to be involved. Complete the required classroom hours can be done at anytime—night, day, weekends, once a month, fulltime, part-time—whatever fits the local needs.

What can be done to provide a measure of uniformity with curriculum offered around the world?

GATS offers four levels and allow you to select the program that best suits your needs and logistics.

Diploma	Ministerial Development 1	600 Classroom Hours	Total of 750 Classroom Hours
Associate Degree	Ministerial Development 2	750 Classroom Hours	Total of 1500 Classroom Hours
Bachelor Degree	Future Educators/Leaders	1500 Classroom Hours	To Be Announced

Each level has a core curriculum required by all schools. This is the minimum standard. Above and beyond the core, each school can add extra classroom hours as needed to core curriculum courses, and/or elective courses that meet local needs not covered by the core curriculum.

Recommended textbooks for each course, in available languages, will be obtainable on the GATS website, and will be password protected.

A GATS Training and Resource CD will be distributed to our missionaries and Bible school administrators annually.

As new resources become available, GATS will post these to the web, and send an e-mail with hyperlinks to our missionaries and school administrators. Press the blue line and presto—the new resource will quickly download in either Microsoft Word or Adobe Portable Document Files.

GATS will also serve as a resource center. E-mail us with questions about needed course materials and we will quickly send our recommendations.

These resources will be specifically for GATS membership schools but also available to those operating schools that may not be part of GATS.

What is proposed for courses where no adequate textbook is available?

A list of courses requiring textbooks is being compiled.

GATS will have a Curriculum Development Committee combining educational minds with cross-cultural experience in the UPCI. Whenever we need a textbook designed a committee will meet made up of subject matter experts, media specialists, writers, and instructional designers.

Once the course is written and edited, we will then embark on translations in major languages.

We will work together to accomplish the task of creating applicable, cross-cultural instructional materials.

GATS will be issue certificates, diplomas, and degrees through the Coordinator of GATS.

Membership schools merely send the transcripts. Once we ensure the GATS standard has been met, the appropriate certificate is released.

GATS is being launched late August 2007.

GATS regional representatives are sensitizing regional leaders concerning the program now.

GATS information is being released to missionaries and national leaders to acquaint them with what will be taking place.

GATS plans to institute the Global College of Ministry. We have already purchased the URL and an e-lesson development program from Australia called "Knowledge Presenter."

This program allows for online studies, a learner management system, and exports to Power Point, or can be placed on an Autorun DVD or CD. We will also have printed components.

We intend developing all our courses, at all levels, for distance education. This is futuristic. Initially, minimal material will be available on our distance education site.

What can be done to better equip our Bible school instructors?

A Bible school will only be as strong as its faculty. GATS is committed to assisting our schools equip, mentor, and develop their staff.

An eighteen lesson basic faculty education course is presently being written. Six lessons will be released in August 2007. A certificate for this course will be awarded to participants.

Other courses in Bible school administration, Curriculum Development and Instructional Design, Educational Psychology, Christian Education for the Adult Learner, Educational Measurement and Evaluation, and Teaching Strategies for Adult Education will be offered in the future. Some form of advanced certificate will be given.
