Course Description	This course studies the development of indigenous, mature, responsible churches in the global context. It fosters an understanding of the globalization of global missions, the rapid expansion of the church, and taking the Gospel from everywhere to everywhere. Leadership development principles, strategies, and models are articulated.

Course Learning Outcomes

This course seeks to partially fulfill the Continuing Missionary Education objectives through a careful study of mission, vision, and planning to facilitate organizational success and fulfill the mandate of Scripture. This further augments continuous personal development, development of others, and organizational development.

Upon completion of this course, students will be able to:

- 1.) Explain the attributes or aspects of the indigenous church.
- 2.) Articulate an understanding of the globalization of global missions.
- 3.) Identify tactics used to offset global missions.
- 4.) List and explain the various biblical images of leaders in Scripture. Evaluate evangelistic efforts of UPCI, national, and local churches.
- 5.) Identify classes or levels of leadership development and develop leadership development lessons or train leaders at each level.



- 6.) Assess problem areas that will develop in the global church if emphasis is not places on leadership development.
- 7.) Identify and be familiar with the various leadership development programs of UPCI global missions.
- 8.) Develop understanding of the changing role of the missionary in indigenous church development.
- 9.) Express cultural problems in leadership development.

Course Design Intentions

Continuing Missionary Education courses are designed for missionaries' educational development no matter their location or technology access. With a basic device and internet connection, missionaries can access their course materials, complete the assignment requirements, and submit their work via email.

Technology Requirements

3. *Personal Statement of Faith*

- a. This assignment is a 2,500-word critical reflection paper.
- b. Analyze and assess the growth of a nationalized mission field using principles and concepts identified and incorporated in the three texts for this course. This requires a comprehension of the textbooks for the course, research into the growth of the nationalized work being studied, reading books written concerning the work, and interviewing past and present missionaries to the field or the area coordinator or the regional director (or a combination of these). If you are the missionary or short-term missionary to the field being studied, then you would conduct a self-analysis and reflection.
