Emphasis will be placed on learning to appreciate other cultures to enhance cross-cultural relationship building and communication. Course Learning Outcomes

This course seeks to partially fulfill the Continuing Missionary Education objectives through a careful study of mission, vision, and planning to facilitate organizational success and fulfill the mandate of Scripture. Course Policies

Course Completion Requirements

The following assignments are required to be completed in full to pass the course. They are to be completed at the student's pace and should be submitted to the instructor's assistant via email. Each GATS course, including the Continuing Missionary Education courses, requires two methods of evaluation in order to be following the academic expectations of the program. The assignments are as follows:

- 1. Complete Reading of the Course's Required Textbook Culture Matters Workbook | U.S. Peace Corps
- 2. Culture Matters Workbook
 - a. Complete the *Culture Matters* workbook (Peace Corps), available on the course page. Finish all exercises, and if a question doesn't apply to you or your culture, write "Does not apply."
 - i. After completing the workbook:
 - 1. Confirm that you finished the entire workbook by submitting the *Workbook Required Responses* document (not the entire workbook).
 - 2. Some workbook exercises will be useful for your written paper/project.
 - 3. If completed with a spouse, include both names on the document.
 - 4. Ignore any references to an answer key in the workbook, as your version will not include it.
- 3. Fieldwork Journal
 - a. Create a *Cultural Anthropology Fieldwork Journal* by selecting a country or culture to study. As you go through the course, use the journal to document your findings about the culture, focusing on at least 15 cultural points. You may include pictures where relevant.
 - i. **Fieldwork focus:** Analyze cross-cultural interactions, conduct interviews, and take detailed notes to understand the chosen culture from their perspective.
 - ii. Learning goals: Develop empathy, global awareness, and recognize your own cultural biases.
 - b. Your journal should:
 - i. Include a title page.
 - ii. Use subheadings for each cultural point.
 - iii. Provide responses in paragraph form.
 - iv. Properly cite sources and include a Works Cited page.
 - v. Optionally, include relevant pictures.
 - c. The final paper should be approximately 2,500 words.
