

Stewardship



Classroom Hours: 24 (minimum)

Description/Overview:

Because “to whom much is given, much is required,” the blessings of God are meant to be managed with wisdom. This course will train the student to enjoy every blessing from God to its fullest extent while exemplifying Biblical management practices in order to bless others, as well as the Kingdom of God.

Objectives:

At the end of this course students will be able to:

- 1.) Identify the origin of stewardship in the Bible, the establishment of its basic principles, and practical application for today.
- 2.) Establish the Old Testament perspective of stewardship.
- 3.) Explain stewardship as seen in the New Testament.
- 4.) Discover the responsibility of a steward from a Biblical view, and understand what he is meant to accomplish.
- 5.) Show that faithfulness is a requirement of stewardship and a prerequisite to greater blessings.
- 6.) Restate that giving has an end result.
- 7.) Assess that offerings should be given voluntarily out of respect and love for God.
- 8.) Differentiate between offerings and alms.
- 9.) Weigh why some people prosper spiritually, financially, and physically while others do not.
- 10.) Summarize how we must be good stewards not only of our treasures but also our time, talents, and the truth of God's Word.
- 11.) Understand the ministers responsibility in all areas of stewardship.
- 12.) Communicate the responsibility of a church member in the area of stewardship.
- 13.) Exemplify the right motivation of a good steward.

- The three stewardship parables given by Jesus.
- What a steward is and what his tasks look like.
- Faithfulness as the crowning mark of distinction among God's people.

- The idea that it is possible to give without loving but not to love without giving.
- Guidelines for giving.
- The principle of sowing and reaping.
- Ways to manage and redeem your time.
